## Last Year

First of all, to appreciate what we are going to expect here in Australia, it's worth looking back at what happened last year. Here is a quick recap of the important events from Australia 2007.

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**Chris:** So very quickly, the top 8 were Raikkonen who gets 10 points, Alonso with 8, Hamilton with 6, Heidfeld gets 5, Fisichella 4, Massa gets 3, Rosberg gets 2, and Ralf Schumacher gets 1.

#### This Year

Results in testing over the winter point towards it being the same contenders fighting for the title as in 2007. Ferrari appear to be very strong, with Raikkonen just edging out team mate Massa. McLaren also featured at the top of the time sheets several times throughout the winter, with new boy Kovalainen adjusting to the car quickly. Alonso may be struggling slightly, having returned to Renault, but he is determined to make the car faster, if not get some wins this year.

BMW are looking set to continue their strong form from last year, and Heidfeld is looking forward to the season getting started. He says: "Autumn in Australia brings the possibility of rain, which would make driving without traction control and engine braking control a real challenge."

With their preview quotes, BMW have given us a small insight into the amount of cargo that needs to be taken to a race. "80 people will be flying down under. Around 32 tonnes of air freight will also be sent on its way from Munich. Among other items, this includes three chassis, the engines, several sets of spares, 160 alloy wheels, 100 radio sets,



headphones, tools, computers and pit lane equipment." That is a lot of stuff, but I'm curious why they need 100 radio sets when they've only got 80 people coming to the race.

Bridgestone have announced that the tyres to be used in Australia will be the medium and softs. Albert Park is essentially a street circuit, and is only used for racing once a year. Therefore, the track will need that little bit of extra time to improve and allow fast times.

Australia will see the debut of Force India F1, the team formerly known as Spyker. With renewed budget, energy and drivers, it will be interesting to see how they will compare to their previous incarnation, whether they can match and hopefully better Spyker's performance.

Also towards the back of the grid, Honda's sister team Super Aguri weren't sure they would even make it to Australia, with money troubles halting a lot of their winter testing. However, they have made it, they're ready to race, and fingers crossed they can make it worth the journey.
